ARCHAEOLOGY AT UHS.

Archaeologist: C-L Seeger-Snowden

Teams: Year 7B1, Year 11 Classical Studies

Provenance: UHS, Parkville.

It is a real pity that very few of us go on a 'dig' for no other reason than to plant a flower, bury something awful or hide the compost. Here, with the lead Archaeologist (me the teacher!) much is dug, even more is found 'in situ' and sometimes we are able to decipher, explain a 'tell' and decide upon a 'provenance'!

As a Unit of work in Year 7 History and as part of Year 11 Classical Studies, all students are required to use the terminology, do the dig, and get the hands dirty, hypothesise...guess!

We start off with learning the correct jargon, and then practise our skills - complete with rubber gloves, searching through tins of sand in which odds and ends have been placed. The budding archaeologists discover in situ, discuss and debate the provenance of their artifacts and finally form an hypothesis about the information gathered. Guess work is of paramount importance.

Since we are unable to garner the funding to go to Greece or Iraq, we need to find open space and a 'real archaeological site'. This interestingly enough is not all that difficult. Most of us have a garden and unless a lot of building work has been done, our own yards are often real treasure troves! The only problem seems to have been...parents!

Much to the aggravation of many of the students, the site area 50cm X 50cm X 50cm has 'necessitated' the able assistance of either mum or dad. ("You can't do this on your own...I'll help...I don't want you accidentally digging up the petunias!") In actual fact the parents seem to have been really interested in the whole concept of homework in the garden, with the intent of finding something, perhaps historically important...and this, of course, is what happened. There was much junk found...paper, old tins, buried dog's bones and bits of dogs...and real live treasure...

An 1886 silver florin...one cent and two cent coins (many of the students had no recollection of these being part of the currency)...a farthing (yes truly! But... "You are not allowed to take that to school..." and my response, "... without this unit of

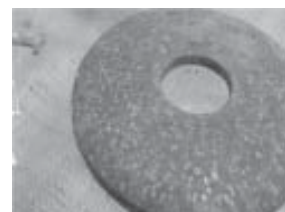
work...?")...Late 19th and early 20th century Willow Ware plate, cup, bowl, and jug 'sherds'...handmade iron nails, beautiful green, purple and licorice coloured

bottles... really old nuts and bolts and washers...metal signs and stencils (advertising the benefits of fresh coffee (ca. 1940's)...old and long forgotten toys from the area of the sand-pit and cubby...metal figurines from the 1920's...door knobs from the Depression...

As to the more common detritus found...bones from a BBQ...metallic wine caps...blown glass bottle bases...glass stoppers...golf balls (much to the frustration of one parent!)

This is not to say that general domestic flotsam and jetsam was not a large part of that which was found in situ...it was...fruit and nut seeds...beer bottles/cans...pull rings...string...paper.

What we learned about our yards, our lives and our history, in the 'tells' that we carefully excavated and analysed, often eventuated in...a greater interest in and desire to carry out another dig, and too... parents continuing to ferret around in the dark, long after the student had retired to write the report that was due the next day!

The UHS PA is a service organisation of the school. It has several important roles including:

Fundraising

The main source of additional funds is the annual book sale. Whilst this provides a valuable service to students, it also generates approximately \$10,000 in revenue that can be used by the school. The PA supports the book sale by promoting the service and providing the volunteer labour needed to ensure its success.

Funding of programs.

Last year the PA assisted with new music wing curtains (\$5000), supply of a new piano (\$5000), help at both the welcome evening for new parents (\$1750) and the Year 12 Valedictory evening (\$2250), a backstage communication system for the Drama Department (approximately \$2000), and publication of a collection of stories from Year 7 Students (approximately \$2200). Last year the PA established the Small Grants program; the Year 7 book publication was funded through this. Applications can be made by students and teachers at any time of the year.

Advocacy/Involvement

Like all parents in the school community, the PA is represented on School Council through the elected parent members. In 2004 we were fortunate in having both Pauline O'Maley and Gaye Champion on School Council, both of whom have been active members of the PA. In addition we had members of the PA involved in the School Council sub-committees: Building and Grounds (Gordon Sandor), Education and Planning (Gaye Champion, David Gurr) and Finance (Richard Evans).

Support for school functions

The PA has provided volunteer support at a variety of school functions. This has included: ticket collection and refreshments at the music evenings and school productions; representation and providing refreshments at a variety of events such as Parent/teacher evenings, welcome evening for new parents, Art Exhibition, and morning teas for new parents.

OUTSTANDING VCE RESULTS IN 2004

University High school achieves outstanding results. In highest group of non selected State High Schools. The results for the 2004 students were excellent. Of the 202 students who were eligible to complete, 99.5% were successful in gaining their VCE. Two students achieved the ENTER scores of 99.85 and 99.80. Congratulations to Alicia Sedghifar and Ray Komatsu.

University High school achieved results in the highest groups for non selected State High Schools. In 2004 6.0% of the year level gained ENTER scores over 99. Also 35.8 % of the students obtained an ENTER score greater than 90.00 while 66.1% of students obtained an ENTER score greater than 80.00. All students are to be congratulated on their efforts during the year as are the staff who taught them.

These are excellent results and reflect the tremendous commitment of the students to their studies and the considerable expertise and dedication of all staff. Another indication of the high quality of results was shown by the fact that 18 % of all of the subject scores that students obtained were 40 or above. This will place a student in the top 8% of any subject .We also had many students who achieved the maximum grade of 50 for their subject. This is an outstanding achievement as only a small number are granted in each subject.

CAREERS FAST TRACK PROGRAM

Earlier this term parents of Year 10 and 9C3 students were sent information about the careers and vocational program that your child will take part in: Careers Fast Track. The program aims to help students identify suitable careers and educational pathways, align careers goals with subject and course options, develop knowledge, skills and abilities in their chosen pathway and become more positive and motivated.

Stage One of the program will take place on **Friday April 22**. Students will complete two assessments: Insight Game & Holland's Self Directed Search (SDS). The assessments will take place in the school hall from **1.30-3.00pm**.

Stage Two will be conducted on **Thursday May 12**. Students will receive their Career Plan Portfolio and they will be instructed how to use this portfolio. Each class will be assigned two sessions for this activity.

Stage Three – students will be timetabled for a **30 minute individual interview** with a consultant from Careers Fast Track. This is an opportunity for students to discuss their career portfolio and clarify options.

Interviews will run from May 16 – May 26, during the school day. (Students will be given their appointment time on May 12)

Overseas Exchanges
