This is also an opportunity to congratulate the 2002 Year 12 group who have been an excellent group throughout the school and have supported the life of the school in a whole range of activities.

Students in the year level have represented the school in every part of school life and I wish them well with the coming examinations and hope all students achieve the results they have worked for.

There are a number of important dates this term including the Musical Breakfast and Valedictory assembly. These are two important events on our calendar.

GTAC

The most recent School Council meeting in September was combined with a public meeting so all parents had the opportunity to hear the architect's briefing regarding GTAC. There was information given and discussion regarding the design of the building and more practical issues to be considered during construction. Tenders will be sought later this month. At the formal Council meeting on that evening a motion of commendation was passed unanimously congratulating the architect on his creative design of the building.

BACK TO SCHOOL DAY

At the end of last term UHS participated in the "Back to School Day".

Past students who attended included The Honourable Joan Kirner, Professor Suzanne Cory, and Mr Sam Lipski. Each of the speakers reflected on their time at UHS and the themes of their remarks were consistent in the memory of learning how to learn and the great diversity of students and acceptance of difference in the school community. I hope these values continue today.

As part of the afternoon Mr Sam Lipski made a presentation to the School Council president, Mr Lester Townsend, on behalf of the Pratt Foundation. Mr Richard Pratt is also an Alumni of the school. The donation of \$50 000 will be used to support the music program and students who need financial support to continue their studies.

The alumni have recently made a generous donation to the school that enabled the purchase of a new piano now located in the library. This will allow musical performances at events in the library as well as provide an opportunity for students to play the instrument at other times during the day. The continuing support of the Alumni is greatly appreciated.

There have been numerous student activities in the past weeks and many of these are reported in *School News*. I am sure parents appreciate the time and hours of work which are given to assist with activities which occur outside of the normal school day.

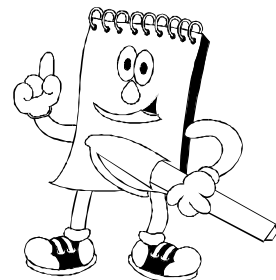

REPORT ON EDUCATION AND PLANNING FOR SCHOOL NEWS

A meeting of the Education and Planning Sub-Committee was held Wednesday 9th October, principally to consider the call for submissions for the expenditure of funds from the Koroit trustees' donation. A range of proposals were considered, including renovations to the Hall and a replacement grand piano for the Performance Centre. There was general support for an upgrade to the Hall, which could possibly be enhanced by a fundraising drive. The Sub-Committee also suggested that the following criteria might be considered when a decision is made:

An expenditure that would benefit all students, though with some flexibility over this;

A project or projects that could be enhanced through fundraising.

As by this time the meeting had moved onto a more general discussion of Music and Theatre Studies at the School, it was agreed to further explore ways of enhancing and supporting the Performing Arts at the next Education and Planning meeting. Staff from the Performing Arts will be invited to participate in the discussion.

Finally, the work being done by the curriculum staff at the School in developing procedures for choice of electives by current year 7, 8 & 9 students, including LOTEs, was presented by Dr Benson, the School's Curriculum Co-ordinator.

The next meeting of the Education and Planning Sub-Committee is on Wednesday 6 November.

OUR ROTARY TRIP!

We were chosen through the school to represent the electorate of Melbourne at a Rotary sponsored 'Adventure in Citizenship' week in Canberra. The theme for the week's activities and the basis of a number of discussions was "2020 Vision: A View Of The Future".

We arrived in Canberra on the Saturday the 17th of August and were greeted by our host parents (members of the Canberra Rotary Club or Canberra-Woden), as well as additional people we were staying with, and spent the day with them. On the Sunday we had a rather large BBQ down by a lake and got to know our fellow delegates. There was a match of touch rugby going on mainly between the NSW and QLD delegates. Following this was a meeting of our 'focus group' where we spent three hours getting to know each other, eating and preparing for some of the upcoming debates. There were certainly some heated discussions in some of the focus groups.

Monday we all received our special tags to go into restricted areas of parliament house and went on a tour. We were then officially welcomed to parliament house by Neil Andrew, speaker of the House of Representatives. After a group photo, it was onto a double decker bus (our mode of transport for the week) and down the road to the Hyatt Hotel Canberra for a Rotary Lunch with a guest speaker, Christian Zahra MP, member for McMillan (Moe area) talking with us. Jacob and I were asked to introduce, conclude and field questions from the audience during this time.

On Tuesday we debated 'The immigration Bill 2002' in which we were delegated roles to play. Following that was a Soapbox (stand on the box and say what you think) on 'My Australia in 2020'. People stood up and talked about what they'd like to see changed and their hopes and aspirations for the future of Australia.

We then had morning tea with Senators and Members of Parliament including Foreign Affairs minister Alexander Downer, before going off to a Teleconference between our school and Members of Parliament. Unfortunately our Rotary Club did not hand in our forms early enough and Lindsay Tanner, member for Melbourne, was unavailable to speak with us. Instead Jacob and I joined Brooke Etchell (Oakleigh) for her Teleconference with Senator Lynn Allison. This was just a day before

Natasha Stott Despoja resigned as Leader of the Democrats. We witnessed question time.

On Wednesday we were at the CSIRO discovery center for most the day. We were split into groups and had to research the issue of salinisation in outback Australia. With the information we received we performed a mock senate committee inquiry. After we had lunch we traveled to the Australian War Memorial (AWM), we performed a wreath-laying ceremony and then had a few hours to ourselves to tour the AWM at will. That night after the AWM we went to this awesome indoor Luna Park meets Scienceworks place called Questacon where much fun was had by all! By this point in the week everyone had formed quite good friendships.

The following day (Thursday) we spent most of the day a parliament house where we took part in a by-election role-play. We were lucky enough to have a visit from the Hon. Kim Beazely. Following this we went to the AIS. We were given a quick tour by some of the athletes and dined in the athletes' dining hall. Finally we heard an inspirational speech from athletics head coach, Chris Nunn.

Friday was a slower paced day compared to the rest of the days. We went for a "behind the scenes" tour of parliament house which included Cabinet room and Prime Minister John Howard's office. Then we walked down to the National Archive of Australia and had to complete a report on an immigrant or immigrants of the past. David Kilby from ABC radio met us there and conducted a test on what we had learnt during our week. Our final educational experience followed when we went down to old parliament house. We had a brief period for shopping. Friday night we had a formal dinner - an emotional experience as most people had to say their final good-byes. I think that everyone was surprised how close the group had become but it had to end at some point.

And finally, on Saturday, as quickly as it had begun, Jacob and I were on the plane back to Melbourne. It was an amazing week. We not only learned about the Australian political structure and how Australia works, but we forged some really strong friendships. We would urge anyone in yr11 next year to apply and take full advantage of this wonderful opportunity. We would also like to thank Mr. G Marchant for his support and for selecting us.

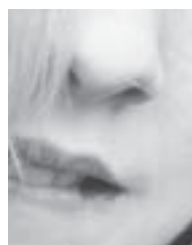

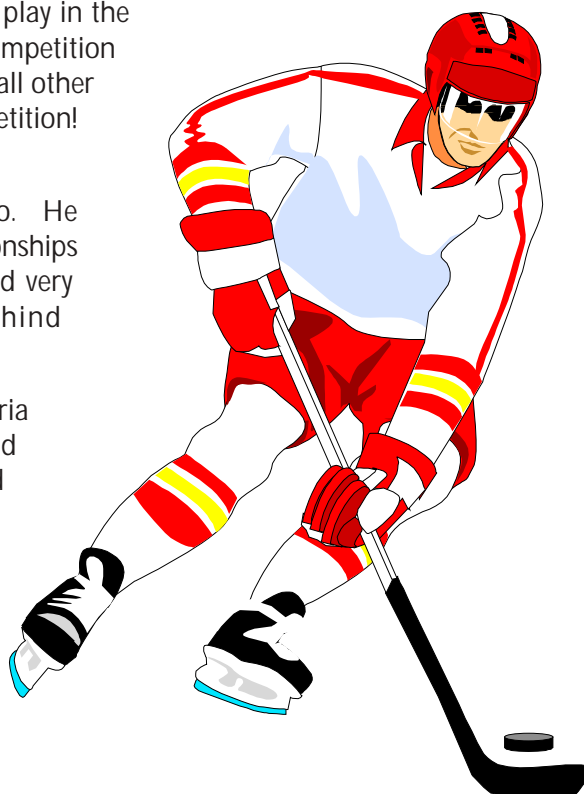
HOLIDAY SPORTING SUCCESS

Please note that the selling day is a Saturday and that **you cannot order books in advance**. It is therefore essential that if you or your child cannot personally come to buy the books you will need a friend or relative to come instead. Cash or cheques are acceptable. **(No facilities for credit cards will be available)**

Year 11 and Year 12 students wishing to sell books will have the opportunity to deposit their books in the library any day during school hours between **November 1st and November 27th**.

Year 10 students will also be able to deposit books at **Room 613**, at **lunchtime** during V.C.E. Orientation week, **December 2nd to 6th**.

The intake of books for sale from **year 7,8 and 9 students** will occur during school hours on **Wednesday 11th and Thursday 12th December**. Students need to make a note of this date, and ensure all their books are at school on that day.

A list of unsold 7 to 10 books will be advertised in the daily bulletin, and the first school newsletter published after the sale. Unsold books can be reclaimed from Rm 613 during the last week of term 4 or the first week of the 2003 school year

Each family will be paid by cheque for their sold books. However these cheques must go through the school system and for that reason we cannot post them until the beginning of the 2003 school year.

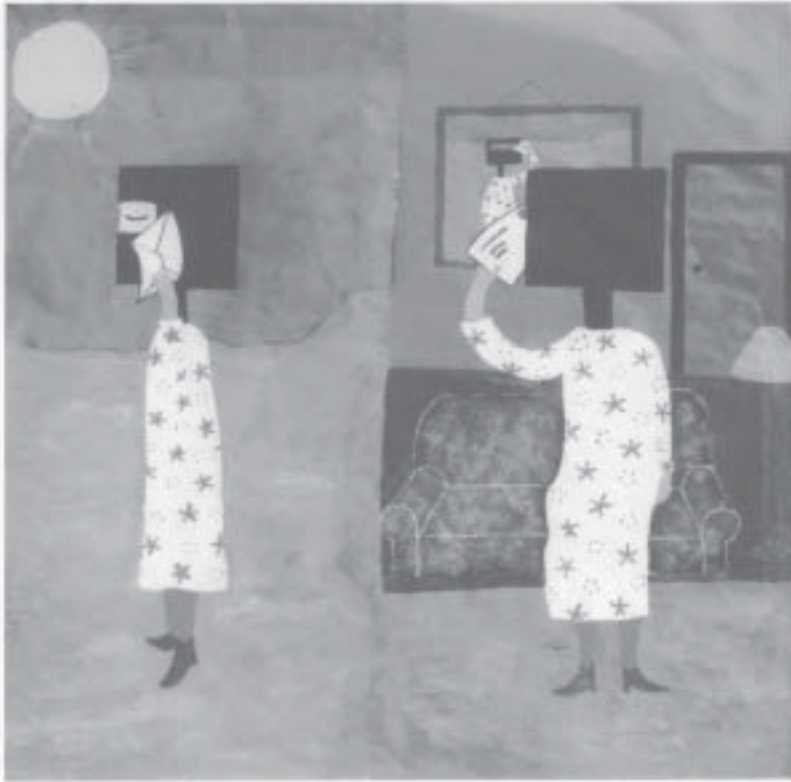
